### BY BUS from Glasgow

Nos 62, 216 & 204 First Bus and No 62 McKindless from Central Station/Argyle Street; No 66 First Bus from Hope Street; No 11 First Bus from Cathedral Street.

### BY TRAIN

From Queen Street (Lower Level) to Clydebank at 2 and 32 minutes past the hour. From Central Station (Lower Level) to Singer at 15 and 45minutes past the hour.

### ON FOOT

From Bus Station/Clydebank Train Station, Chalmers Street:  
Walk along Alexander St. to Dumbarton Rd. Turn left and cross at the traffic lights to Queens Quays. Walk along Cart St. until you come to the Titan Crane Pursor's Office.

From Singer Train Station:

Take the steps up to Kilbowie Rd. Turn right and follow Kilbowie Rd to Dumbarton Rd. Turn left towards the traffic lights and cross to Queen's Quays. See above.

# TITAN CLYDEBANK

To experience the Titan crane at Clydebank, you must see the view from the top. Standing 150 feet above ground level, you will get a true sense of the power and history of this amazing engineering triumph which is able to lift 200 tons and which has dominated the Clydebank horizon for 100 years.

Titan Clydebank, the oldest of the five titans on the Clyde, was designed and built by Sir William Arrol and Co of Dalmarnock and was installed in 1907. It was the largest of the cranes in the John Brown Shipyard and was used in the fit out of most of the major ships built there, including the Queen Mary and the QE2.

Built to last, the Titan Clydebank famously survived the blitz in WWII, which devastated the Clydebank area. Now, its 'A' listed status celebrates the Titan's resilience and its significance to the industrial heritage of the Clyde and to Scotland as a whole.

The £3 million restoration of the crane, managed by Clydebank re-built the local urban regeneration company, has ensured that the Titan will continue to dominate Clydebank's skyline, reflecting its proud industrial past while signalling its economic renaissance.

# THE TITAN TOUR

Join us at the Pursor's Office for the start of the 45-minute Titan Experience. Board the courtesy shuttle bus for the short journey to the foot of the crane. Don't forget to look up!

Take the two-minute elevator ride to the top and step out onto the jib, 150ft over the River Clyde. You can walk along the jib looking down to the base of the crane through the mesh floor and you will get a real insight into the working lives of the men who operated the crane.

Using the special binocular viewers, you can admire the uninterrupted views and take in the surrounding scenery. To the East lies the city of Glasgow and to the West you can see the full span of the Erskine Bridge. Although it is remarkably peaceful at the top, the sky can be busy with flights to and from Glasgow International Airport, which is only a few miles South. Your visit continues to the wheelhouse or rope room where you can see the workings of the crane and a photographic exhibition spanning the Titan's history.

There will also be a chance, through modern technology, to go back in time to John Browns Shipyard in the 1930s and 1960s and re-live the launches of the Queen Mary and the QE2. This has been made possible through the commissioning of Glasgow School of Art's Digital Design Studio to create digital animations of the launches of these great ships.

Then it's back to the lift and down to the mini-coach to return to the Pursor's Office where you can browse in the gift shop for a book or souvenir of your visit.
